
Year 11 Parents: Preparing for Your Child's Exams

A timetable for the year is on the website as well as a detailed GCSE timetable.

Any concerns, let a member of staff know as soon as possible.








Exam Dates and Timetables

- Exams cannot be moved, they are fixed by the exam board
- Any issues or problems, let us know as soon as possible
- There will be ONE set of PPEs (mocks) in January and February
- These are critical to checking pupils' understanding and are undertaken in strict exam conditions

- The National Contingency Days are Wednesday 11th June -PM and <u>Wednesday 25th June</u> - all day. Pupils must be available up to and including the final date in case of any rescheduling.








Exam Dates and Timetables

- There are two clashes where exams take place in the same session. Pupils will sit one examination at the allotted time, they then have a 20 minute supervised break before proceeding with the next one.
- These are: Media Studies and Cam Nat Sport Studies on Wed 14th May PM and Engineering and French on Wed 21st May AM.
- To allow pupils to be used to this way of working we are replicating this in our PPEs taking place in January.



Step 2 \rightarrow Checkpoint (5 minutes)


Step 3 \rightarrow Apply knowledge (10 minutes)






The Leitner Method: let's demonstrate an example






Revision

The NEA accounts for differing percentages of the overall mark depending on the subject.

NEA normally includes a practical element.

Although the NEA is completed in school, pupils can complete preparation work and research in their own time.








MCAS Parent Portal - Online Parental Engagement

Apprenticeships

An apprenticeship is a job where you learn while working.

It gives you skills necessary for you to learn and gain experience of a specific job role whilst getting paid.

Apprenticeships start at the equivalent of a GCSE and can progress to degree level and beyond.

All apprentices have contracts of employment, a salary and full employee rights. Apprentices are valuable to employers because they contribute to the success of the business. Whilst working you will also improve your skills and be of greater value to your employer.

An apprenticeship will not cost an apprentice anything, even at degree level – meaning there is no debt, and you get a wage too!

At Risedale:

All of our Y11 pupils have been given assemblies to learn about different types of apprenticeships, and those interested in finding out more were invited to attend a workshop in Y10. There is another opportunity to a follow-up workshop, with an emphasis on finding an apprenticeship and applications over the next few weeks.

There are many different apprenticeships out there and some might surprise you - it's worth investigating.

Please speak to Mrs Porritt our Careers Leader who is here tonight, for more information. Places tend to be quite competitive, so do your preparation well.



Careers



T-Levels

A T-Level is classroom-based technical training for 16-19 year olds, equivalent to three A-Levels. It focuses on building the vocational skills you need to enter skilled employment in a particular occupational area, and takes two academic years to complete.

- Building services engineering for construction
- Design, surveying and planning for construction
- Onsite construction
- Digital production, design and development
- Digital support services
- Design and development for engineering and manufacturing
- Maintenance, installation and repair for engineering and manufacturing
- Engineering, manufacturing, processing and control
- Education and childcare
- Health
- Healthcare science
- Science
- Accounting
- Finance
- Agriculture, land management and production
- Animal care and management (starting September 2024)
- Catering
- Craft and design
- Hairdressing, barbering and beauty therapy
- Media, broadcast and production
- Legal services



Other Technical Training Opportunities

There are a range of other technical qualifications that offer practical learning programmes that relate to specific job roles or employment sectors.

- BTECs: level 1 to 7 qualifications
- Cambridge Nationals: level 1 and 2 qualifications
- Cambridge Technicals: level 2 and 3 qualifications

Careers



Study Programmes

Study Programmes offered by both colleges and ITPs are available for 16-19 year olds (or up to 25 with an Education and Health Care Plan).

They provide tailored learning that supports your development and progression in line with what you want to do for a career.

Each Study Programme is built around what you want and need, but typically they can involve:

- Substantial qualifications (this includes some of the options explained earlier, such as T-Levels)
- Work experience placement
- Other non-qualification activity to develop your skills and confidence
- English and maths (if you haven't achieved a GCSE Grade 4 in either subject)
- Study Programmes are fully funded by the government. Neither learners nor employers are required to make any financial contribution to them. Some learners may also be eligible for 16 to 19 Bursary Fund


MPCT, Darlington:
