he 6th June this year marks the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings. In 1944, thousands of soldiers lost their lives on the Normandy beaches - an event that became a significant turning point in the Second World War. British Army Band Catterick travelled to Normandy as part of Op ORBITE to perform at various memorial services to commemorate the occasion. It was in Normandy that the Allies' victory paved the way for the liberation of France, and much of North-West Europe, so there was no location more fitting to perform in.

Op ORBITE was a tri-service operation ran by 67 Gurkha Fd Sqn. The operation resulted in several events, with music performed by either the British Army, or the Royal Air Force. One service in Bayeux Cemetery was particularly poignant. Surrounded by the graves of fallen soldiers, Sgt Walker gave a moving performance of *Last Post* to a large audience that included HM Princess Anne. Music such as *David of The White Rock, Manchester Hymn* and *Amazing Grace* were



performed by the band throughout the ceremony, and the Pendyrus Male Choir was excellent.

Later in the week, the band performed in the town of Arromanches, right in front of the beach. The backdrop of Gold Beach served as a solemn reminder of what had happened in Arromanches eighty years ago, however this event felt slightly more celebratory than the last. The vast crowds were excited, and the weather was sunny. As the band played Vera Lynn's well-known wartime song, We'll Meet Again, a WWII veteran and a vicar, amongst many others, danced together and sung along.

Between rehearsals and performances, the band resided, amongst several other units, in a tented village based close to the town of Bayeux. The atmosphere in the town was buzzing; the streets of Bayeux were decorated for the week, with WWII inspired artwork painted in shop and cafe windows and flags hanging across alleyways. 1940's vehicles could also be seen driving down the street. When the band wasn't rehearsing or performing, many spent their spare time in Bayeux, visiting the tapestry and museum, and trying local delicacies.

As time goes on, less and less veterans are able to attend the services in Normandy, so every time we are able to provide them with music is such an honour. Lest we forget.

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# THE ROYAL CORPS OF SIGNALS CELEBRATED 100 YEARS OF ASSOCIATION WITH CATTERICK GARRISON AND RICHMOND TOWN

n Friday the I 2th July 2024 soldiers and veterans of the Royal Corps of Signals marched from Nunns Close Car Park through the streets of Richmond and paraded in the Town Centre in front of the Town Hall. The parade and the people of Richmond were addressed by the Mayor of Richmond, Cllr Bob White (ex Royal Signals) and the Royal Signals Association Chairman, Major General David McDowall CBE.

Organised by the Catterick Branch of the Royal Signals Association (RSA), the parade also welcomed a visit by the local Member of Parliament for Richmond and Northallerton and Former Prime Minister the Rt Hon Rishi Sunak.

The event was named Project Centurion, which seemed a fitting title for celebrating the 100 year-long relationship between the Royal Corps of Signals and the town of Richmond, North Yorkshire, on the doorstep of Catterick Garrison. 2024 not only marks that centenary, but also the 60th anniversary of the town bestowing on the Corps the Freedom of Richmond, which gives it the right to march

through Richmond with '*drums beating and banners flying*', a rare honour showing the close links between townspeople and soldiers.

The Royal Signals Association (RSA) Chairman, Major General David McDowall CBE stated, 'I am most grateful to the Mayor and Council of Richmond for giving permission for the Corps to celebrate Project Centurion and the Freedom of Richmond and I am honoured to return to Richmond on the occasion of the centenary of the Royal Signals in Catterick. It is particularly important to me, as it was 50 years ago in February 1974 that I arrived in Catterick to become a Royal Signals soldier. I returned to Catterick many times during my career and on my final visit, I took the salute at a Passing Out Parade at Vimy Barracks which by then had become the Infantry Training Centre. To begin my career as a soldier and finish it as a Major General, both in the same place, makes Richmond very special to me.'

The event followed with Rishi, the Mayor, Major General David, and the deputy Lord Lieutenant of North Yorkshire meeting, inspecting and chatting to the soldiers and veterans. The Royal Signals Association Padre David Hargreaves held a short service before the troops were fallen out. Members of the Catterick Branch of the RSA, town councillors and invited guests were invited to a small presentation in the Town Hall while the soldiers and other veterans met in the Cricket Club.

The Chairman, of the Catterick Branch of the RSA, Mr John Mcilree who served in Catterick three times before finishing his military career there in 1990, stated that 'many older veterans see Catterick as the spiritual home of the Corps.'

# **WHIT FRIDAY**

n the 24th May, the British Army Band Catterick took part in the Whit Friday competitions, held in Saddleworth and Tameside. Whit Friday is an event that spans several villages, with an individual contest held at each location. Brass bands from up and down the country travel to these villages to compete against each other - up to 50 bands compete throughout the night. The competitions include performing a march down to the performance spot, where bands are judged on their marching capability, followed by a static performance of a march, where an adjudicator blindly listens and ranks each performance perspectively.

This event was an excellent opportunity to advertise British Army Music, demonstrate our capability and attract potential recruits. It was also a unique experience for our musicians, as they got to compete against some of the finest brass bands from across the country.

Preparation began several weeks before the event. The band voted on which march we would be performing and selected *Ravenswood* by William Rimmer. *Ravenswood* is a classic march that is technically challenging for every instrumentalist. It would be performed up to 10 times throughout the evening, so it was imperative for the band to be in top form.

With the march selected, the band obtained the help of a subject matter expert, Mr Garry

Cutt. He has won the Whit Friday competition several times with the Fairey Band, Foden's, and Brighouse and Rastrick - these are some of the best brass bands in the world. With the help of Mr Cutt, the band excelled as a musical ensemble; the dynamics were controlled, the ensemble was tightened up, and we learnt a few tricks of the trade.

The day finally arrived, and the band performed at the villages of Lydgate, Grotton, Greenfield, Uppermill, and finally Dobcross.

The night was a success and not only did the band thoroughly enjoy the competition, but we managed to get a result of 4th place at Dobcross, winning £100 for the Army Benevolent Fund.

At the Catterick showcase Eva was named Team Captain for Team England.

The trip was a valuable addition to their curriculum, sparking their interest in the rich local heritage of Catterick Garrison.

#### A Touching Tribute

Adding a special touch to the exhibition was a display of poems written by Risedale School pupils about Armistice - Remembrance Day. ### Mark Hill MBE tells us more about the exhibition in his own words

"As May marks Local and Community History Month, the Catterick Historical Archive, in collaboration with Headquarters Catterick Garrison, North Yorkshire Council Catterick, Richmond and Colburn Community Libraries came together to celebrate the rich history of the Catterick area.



This collaboration culminated in a captivating history exhibition hosted at the Catterick Library, showcasing a diverse array of artefacts from different periods, including Roman and Saxon relics, as well as items from both World Wars. Students also explored a collection of archaeological specimens, including fossils from extinct flora.

The exhibition was inaugurated by the Garrison Commander, who delivered a poignant speech before officially opening the event by cutting the ribbon. Attended by local school children from Risedale School, Le Cateau Community Primary School and Cambrai Primary School along with Veterans and members of the public, the exhibition aimed to educate and engage visitors of all ages.

During the exhibition, participating schools engaged in educational exercises crafted by their teachers, designed to encourage fact-finding and note-taking. A highlight of the display was a Morse Code table equipped with an osculator key, providing students with the opportunity to learn about this historic communication method by writing their names and secret messages in Morse Code.

Adding an immersive touch to the exhibition, one of the Veterans from the Catterick Historical Archive Group donned the attire of a Roman soldier, lending authenticity to discussions about the Roman artefacts with young attendees. Additionally, a moving poem titled 'Poppy Fields of Remembrance,' penned by a Veteran around Armistice, Remembrance, was prominently featured, offering a poignant reflection on the sacrifices made during wartime.

The Garrison Library, known for its extensive military book section, further enriched the exhibition experience with recorded voices of Veterans sharing their personal stories through the Garrison Origins project. These narratives provide visitors with a deeper understanding of the experiences of those who served.

Central to the event was the mission to educate young people about the local history and heritage of Catterick Garrison and its surrounding parishes, while also inspiring a love for reading. The opening of the exhibition was covered by BFBS Catterick, amplifying the reach of our message and ensuring that the community was informed about this unique opportunity to delve into Catterick's past.

Risedale's Y10 pupils get equipped for the future with inspiring Enterprise Day

Year 10 pupils at Risedale recently gained valuable life skills in preparation for further education and the world of work through an engaging Enterprise Day.

Held on Wednesday 8th May, the event was facilitated by "As *Creatives*," a specialist company delivering interactive learning workshops for schools nationwide. Focusing on developing crucial "soft skills" sought after by employers, the day centred on the "5 *Rs*": Relationships, Resourcefulness, Risk-taking, Resilience, and Reflection.

The day kicked off with pupils divided into teams of four. They then tackled two stimulating activities:

The Trading Game: Transformed into countries, teams navigated stock and share trading with a simulated "*World Bank*," experiencing the importance of collaboration and strategy.

The Bunker: Putting teamwork and communication to the test, pupils tackled a code-breaking challenge, honing their connection-building skills.

The afternoon saw the year group participate in a "Getting Ready for Work" workshop, equipping them with essential knowledge and confidence for their upcoming Work Experience Week.

Along the way, Gary met other walkers, but the adventure was mainly a solo one. He camped in his one-man tent most of the time but also stayed in hostels and with friends along the route. His friends who offered him a place to stay would drop him back at his starting point the next day. During the walk, Gary only stayed at home in Darlington for 2 nights to rest, enjoy some home comforts, and buy a replacement pair of walking boots!

During his journey, Gary posted daily updates to his social media pages, sharing images of the beautiful scenery, changeable weather, and mileage updates. His love of coffee, cake, and the occasional pint of Guinness was also evident in the photos he posted.

Gary remarked, "Every morning, I posted a selfie and it was wonderful to receive everyone's messages of encouragement. It truly motivated me throughout the day, and I enjoyed reading the comments. It felt like everyone was with me, supporting me along the way with their kind messages."

This isn't the first time Gary has travelled from Land's End to John O'Groats; in fact, it's his 5th time, which he completed between 2009 and 2015. However, all his previous Land's End to John O'Groats adventures were done by bike, often with the Hummersknott Cycle group which he led with fellow Risedale School colleague, Gary Lamont.

Upon reaching Scotland, Gary knew the finish line was in sight. He then set up and shared his JustGiving page to appeal for donations to Prostate Cancer UK.

Gary explained, "I chose not to set up the donation page at the start of the walk just in case I couldn't finish, and I didn't want to disappoint anyone. But the support I've received has been astonishing. I am so grateful!"

#### Cyanotype Workshop

Risedale School Pupils Embrace the Sun with Cyanotype Workshop



On Wednesday 26th June, a group of Risedale School pupils delved into the world of alternative photography with a cyanotype workshop. Led by Design & Technology teacher Katie-Anna Vizor and visiting artist Elaine Vizor, the session offered a unique opportunity for the pupils to explore a sunlight-powered artistic technique with a rich history dating back to the 1840s. Cyanotypes, also known as blueprints, were invented by Sir John Herschel as a way to reproduce scientific documents. This early photographic process uses light-sensitive iron salts to create distinctive blueprints.

#### "It was a wonderful experience for the pupils," shared Mrs Vizor. "Having my own Mum, Elaine, guide them through this historic process made it even more special."

The workshop began with Elaine introducing the cyanotype process to the pupils. They started by creating small cyanotypes on specialised photosensitive paper, familiarising themselves with the technique. As their confidence grew, they progressed to larger-scale projects, experimenting with textiles and even creating cyanotype designs on t-shirts.

Sunny skies proved to be a perfect partner for the workshop. Mrs Vizor remarked, "The pupils truly enjoyed the experience, and the cyanotypes they created were fantastic. The beautiful weather allowed us to use sunlight effectively to expose the cyanotypes, making the entire day a resounding success."

Elaine Vizor added to the positive atmosphere, commenting, "It was a fantastic afternoon working with the Risedale pupils. I normally work with adults, so to have the opportunity to share my knowledge with secondary school pupils was a brilliant experience."

She added, "Every pupil was engaged in the process. They were magnificent and a pleasure to work with. Their creativity shone through and their individuality was evident in the varied designs they produced. The workshop went very smoothly and too quickly. We covered a lot of ground and it was a joy to work with such an interested, motivated and appreciative group of young people. 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

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# RISEDALE EXPLORERS: A JOURNEY THROUGH TIME ON THE CATTERICK CAMP MILITARY RAILWAY

ast week, our final two groups of Year 8 pupils from Risedale School embarked on an exciting journey back in time as part of their history field trips with historians from the Catterick Historical Archive. The Risedale Explorers walked along a significant portion of where the old Catterick Camp Military Railway track once ran, which was a bustling line in its heyday. This hands-on experience offered the pupils a unique opportunity to connect with their local history and understand the profound changes that have shaped their community over the past century.

The adventure began with a talk about the history of what we now call Catterick Garrison, setting the stage for an engaging and educational walk back towards the Camp Centre Roundabout. Along the way, pupils had the privilege of interacting with Veterans from the Catterick Historical Archive group. These Veterans shared their wealth of knowledge, painting vivid pictures of how the area



has evolved over more than 100 years. Their stories and insights provided invaluable context to the historical significance of the Catterick Camp Military Railway.

On Thursday, the first group of pupils enjoyed their packed lunches at Sandes Soldiers Home, a place rich with history and memories of soldiers past. The following day, the second group dined at The Centenary Hub in Piave Lines, another venue steeped in military history showcasing photos and pictures from over the decades. These lunch stops were not just breaks in the journey but also opportunities for the pupils to immerse themselves further in the historical ambience of the locations.



After lunch, both groups travelled to the Locomotion Railway Museum in Shildon. Here, the pupils attended a short presentation by the museum's Senior Explainer, who provided a comprehensive overview of the Catterick Camp Military Railway. This presentation was instrumental in linking the local history they had been exploring with the broader narrative of railway development and military logistics.

The pupils also had the chance to explore the museum, delve into its exhibits, and visit the shop and cafe. This part of the trip allowed them to explore the incredible and legendary locomotives throughout railway history and gain a deeper appreciation for the technological advancements in this field. Part of our guided tour included the New Hall, which tells the story of the North East's role in early railway development with six themed roads of railway vehicles.

Overall, these field trips were a resounding success. They not only enriched the pupils' understanding of their local history but also allowed them to engage with historical sources and veterans firsthand. Last week's exploration has undoubtedly sparked a deeper interest in history among the Year 8 pupils and provided them with memories that will last a lifetime.

Catterick Historical Archive continues to inspire and educate, bringing learning out of the classroom and into the lives of young people. We look forward to many more such enriching experiences in the future.







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
